morning of the wedding hadriana drinks a mysterious potion and collapses at the altar transformed into a zombie her wedding becomes her funeral she is buried by the town revived by an evil sorcerer and then disappears into popular legend set against a backdrop of magic and eroticism and recounted with delirious humor the novel raises universal questions about race and sexuality the reader comes away enchanted by the marvelous reality of haiti s vodou culture and convinced of depestre s lusty claim that all beings even the undead ones have a right to happiness and true love from the introduction by edwidge danticat depestre offers us the kind of tale we rarely get in the hundreds of zombie stories featuring haitians stories set both inside and outside of haiti in hadriana in all my dreams we get both langaj the secret language of haitian vodou as well as the type of descriptive elegiac erotic and satirical language and the artistic license needed to create this most nuanced and powerful novel

women in haiti have played a large role in changing the balance of political and social power even as they have endured rampant and devastating state sponsored violence including torture rape abuse illegal arrest disappearance and assassination beverly bell an activist and an expert on haitian social movements brings together thirty eight oral histories from a diverse group of haitian women the interviewees include for example a former prime minister an illiterate poet a leading feminist theologian and a vodou dancer defying victim status despite gender and

state based repression they tell how haiti s poor and dispossessed women have fought for their personal and collective survival the women s powerfully moving accounts of horror and heroism can best be characterized by the creole word istwa which means both story and history they combine theory with case studies concerning resistance gender and alternative models of power photographs of the women who have lived through haiti s recent past accompany their words to further personalize the interviews in walking on fire
