an nyrb classics original it is a sunny summer sunday in a remote swiss village and a christening is being celebrated at a lovely old farmhouse one of the guests notes an anomaly in the fabric of the venerable edifice a blackened post that has been carefully built into a trim new window frame thereby hangs a tale one that as the wise old grandfather who has lived all his life in the house proceeds to tell it takes one chilling turn after another while his audience listens in appalled silence featuring a cruelly

overbearing lord of the manor and the oppressed villagers who must render him service an irreverent young woman who will stop at nothing a mysterious stranger with a red beard and a green hat and last but not least the black spider the tale is as riveting and appalling today as when jeremias gotthelf set it down more than a hundred years ago the black spider can be seen as a parable of evil in the heart or of evil at large in society thomas mann saw it as foretelling the advent of nazism or as a vision anticipating h p lovecraft of cosmic horror there s no question in any case that it is unforgettably creepy harriet is leaving her boyfriend claude the french rat that at least is how harriet sees things even if it s claude who has just asked harriet to leave his greenwich village apartment well one way or another she has no intention of leaving to the contrary she will stay and exact revenge or would have if claude had not had her unceremoniously evicted still though moved out harriet is not about to move on not in any way girlfriends circle around to patronize and advise but harriet only takes offense and it s easy to understand why because mad and maddening as she may be harriet sees past the polite platitudes that everyone else is content to spout and live by she is an unblinkered unbuttoned unrelenting and above all bitingly funny prophetess of all that is wrong with women s lives and hearts until in a surprise twist she finds a savior in a dark room at the chelsea hotel one of simenon s darkest novels le monde on a foggy winter s evening in dieppe after the arrival of the daily ferry from england a railway signalman habitually scrutinizes the port from his tiny isolated cabin when a scuffle on the quayside catches his eye he is drawn to the scene of a brutal murder and his once quiet life changes forever a mere observer at first he soon finds himself fishing a briefcase from the water and in doing so he enters a feverish and secret chase as the murderer and witness stalk and spy on each other they gain an increasingly profound yet tacit understanding of each other until the witness becomes an accomplice written in 1933 soon after the successful

launch of the inspector maigret novels this haunting atmospheric novel soon became a classic and the inspiration for several film and tv adaptations publisher description rick martin loved music and the music loved him he could pick up a tune so quickly that it didn't matter to the cotton club boss that he was underage or to the guys in the band that he was just a white kid he started out in the slums of la with nothing and he ended up on top of the game in the speakeasies and nightclubs of new york but while talent and drive are all you need to make it in music they aren't enough to make it through a life dorothy baker's young man with a horn is widely regarded as the first jazz novel and it pulses with the music that defined an era baker took her inspiration from the artistry though not the life of legendary horn player bix beiderbecke and the novel went on to be adapted into a successful movie starring kirk douglas lauren bacall and doris day seemingly the simplest of stories a passing anecdote of village life rock crystal opens up into a tale of almost unendurable suspense this jewel like novella by the writer that thomas mann praised as one of the most extraordinary the most enigmatic the most secretly daring and the most strangely gripping narrators in world literature is among the most unusual moving and memorable of christmas stories two children conrad and his little sister sanna set out from their village high up in the alps to visit their grandparents in the neighboring valley it is the day before christmas but the weather is mild though of course night falls early in december and the children are warned not to linger the grandparents welcome the children with presents and pack them off with kisses then snow begins to fall ever more thickly and steadily undaunted the children press on only to take a wrong turn the snow rises higher and higher time passes it is deep night when the sky clears and conrad and sanna discover themselves out on a glacier terrifying and beautiful the heart of the void adalbert stifter's rapt and enigmatic tale beautifully translated by elizabeth mayer and marianne moore explores what can be found

their common stupidity but neither happy nor free this new selection of macdonald s finest essays assembled by john summers the editor of the baffler reintroduces a remarkable american critic and writer in the era of smart sexy and everything indie macdonald remains as pertinent and challenging as ever henry david thoreau s journal was his life s work the daily practice of writing that accompanied his daily walks the workshop where he developed his books and essays and a project in its own right one of the most intensive explorations ever made of the everyday environment the revolving seasons and the changing self it is a treasure trove of some of the finest prose in english and for those acquainted with it its prismatic pages exercise a hypnotic fascination yet at roughly seven thousand pages or two million words it remains thoreau s least known work this reader s edition the largest one volume edition of thoreau s journal ever published is the first to capture the scope rhythms and variety of the work as a whole ranging freely over the world at large the journal is no less devoted to the life within as thoreau says it is in vain to write on the seasons unless you have the seasons in you the widow is the story of two outcasts and their fatal encounter one is the widow herself tati still young she s never had an easy time of it but she s not the kind to complain tati lives with her father in law on the family farm putting up with his sexual attentions working her fingers to the bone improving the property and knowing all the time that her late husband s sister is scheming to kick her out and take the house back the other is a killer just out of prison and in search of a new life jean meets up with tati who hires him as a handyman and then takes him to bed things are looking up at least until jean falls hard for the girl next door the widow was published in the same year as camus the stranger and andré gide judged it the superior book it is georges simenon s most powerful and disturbing exploration of the bond between death and desire new york s lower east side was said to be the most densely populated square mile on earth in the 1890s

health inspectors called the neighborhood the suicide ward  
diarrhea epidemics raged each summer killing thousands of  
children sweatshop babies with smallpox and typhus dozed in  
garment heaps destined for fashionable shops desperate mothers  
paced the streets to soothe their feverish children and white  
mourning cloths hung from every building a third of the children  
living there died before their fifth birthday by 1911 the child  
death rate had fallen sharply and the new york times hailed the  
city as the healthiest on earth in this witty and highly personal  
autobiography public health crusader dr s josephine baker  
explains how this transformation was achieved by the time she  
retired in 1923 baker was famous worldwide for saving the lives  
of 90 000 children the programs she developed many still in use  
today have saved the lives of millions more she fought for women  
s suffrage toured russia in the 1930s and captured typhoid mary  
mallon twice she was also an astute observer of her times and  
fighting for life is one of the most honest compassionate memoirs

this novel has been published in previous translations as maigret  
at the crossroads and the crossroad murders compelling

remorseless brilliant john gray one of the greatest writers of the twentieth century simenon was unequalled at making us look inside though the ability was masked by his brilliance at absorbing us obsessively in his stories guardian a supreme writer unforgettable vividness independent one of his most erotic and emotionally charged stories the times two people who didn't know each other and who had come together by a miracle in the great city and who now clung desperately to each other as if already they felt a chilly solitude settling in a divorced actor and a lonely woman both adrift in new york meet by chance in an all night diner it is the start of something though neither is sure what as they move through neon lit streets bars rented rooms and cheap motels these two lost souls struggle to understand what it is that has brought them in spite of themselves inexorably together simenon casts his characteristic spell from the opening lines there is an evanescent hallucinatory almost dreamlike quality throughout daily telegraph three bedrooms in manhattan is about how we resist love how we get dragged into it spat out dragged back in against our will los angeles times what you have loved remains yours thus speaks the irresistible rogue sindbad ironic hero of these fantastic tales who has seduced and abandoned countless women over the course of centuries but never lost one for he returns to visit them all ladies actresses housemaids in his memories and dreams from the bustling streets of budapest to small provincial towns where nothing ever seems to change this ghostly lothario encounters his old flames wherever he goes along the banks of the danube under windows where they once courted in churches and in graveyards where eros and thanatos tryst lies bad behavior and fickleness of all kinds are forgiven and love is reaffirmed as the only thing worth persevering for weeping for and living for the adventures of sindbad is the hungarian master gyula krúdy's most famous book an uncanny evocation of the autumn of the hapsburg empire that is enormously popular not only in hungary but throughout eastern europe stones of aran

pilgrimage is as robert macfarlane says in his introduction one of the most sustained intensive and imaginative studies of a place that has ever been carried out that place is one of the most mysterious and oldest inhabited landscapes in the world the islands of aran off the west coast of ireland tim robinson s epic exploration of the desolate storm lashed limestone rocks which have already haunted generations of irish writers takes the form of a clockwise journey around the coast every cliff inlet and headland reveals layers of myth and historical memory and robinson makes beautifully crafted observations about the habits of birds plants and the humans who lived there and endured leaving records in stone on the walls cairns and ancient forts in story and in oral tradition paul goodman s growing up absurd was a runaway best seller when it was first published in 1960 and it became one of the defining texts of the new left goodman was a writer and thinker who broke every mold and did it brilliantly he was a novelist poet and a social theorist among a host of other things and the book s surprise success established him as one of america s most unusual and trenchant critics combining vast learning an astute mind utopian sympathies and a wonderfully hands on way with words for goodman the unhappiness of young people was a concentrated form of the unhappiness of american society as a whole run by corporations that provide employment if and when they do but not the kind of meaningful work that engages body and soul goodman saw the young as the first casualties of a humanly repressive social and economic system and as such the front line of potential resistance noam chomsky has said paul goodman s impact is all about us and certainly it can be felt in the powerful localism of today s renascent left a classic of anarchist thought growing up absurd not only offers a penetrating indictment of the human costs of corporate capitalism but points the way forward it is a tale of yesterday s youth that speaks directly to our common future an nyrb classics original robert sheckley was an eccentric master of the american short

story and his tales whether set in dystopic city scapes ultramodern advertising agencies or aboard spaceships lighting out for hostile planets are among the most startlingly original of the twentieth century today as the new worlds alternate universes and synthetic pleasures shekley foretold become our reality his vision begins to look less absurdist and more prophetic this retrospective selection chosen by jonathan lethem and alex abramovich brings together the best of shekley s deadpan farces proving once again that he belongs beside such mordant critics of contemporary mores as bruce jay friedman terry southern and thomas pynchon anna seghers s transit is an existential political literary thriller that explores the agonies of boredom the vitality of storytelling and the plight of the exile with extraordinary compassion and insight having escaped from a nazi concentration camp in germany in 1937 and later a camp in rouen the nameless twenty seven year old german narrator of seghers s multilayered masterpiece ends up in the dusty seaport of marseille along the way he is asked to deliver a letter to a man named weidel in paris and discovers weidel has committed suicide leaving behind a suitcase containing letters and the manuscript of a novel as he makes his way to marseille to find weidel s widow the narrator assumes the identity of a refugee named seidler though the authorities think he is really weidel there in the giant waiting room of marseille the narrator converses with the refugees listening to their stories over pizza and wine while also gradually piecing together the story of weidel whose manuscript has shattered the narrator s deathly boredom bringing him to a deeper awareness of the transitory world the refugees inhabit as they wait and wait for that most precious of possessions transit papers a schoolboy s diary brings together more than seventy of robert walser s strange and wonderful stories most never before available in english opening with a sequence from walser s first book fritz kocher s essays the complete classroom assignments of a fictional boy who has met a tragically early death this selection

ranges from sketches of uncomprehending editors overly passionate readers and dreamy artists to tales of devilish adultery sexual encounters on a train and walser s service in world war i throughout walser s careening confounding delicious voice holds the reader transfixed the liberal imagination is one of the most admired and influential works of criticism of the last century a work that is not only a masterpiece of literary criticism but an important statement about politics and society published in 1950 one of the chillier moments of the cold war trilling s essays examine the promise and limits of liberalism challenging the complacency of a naïve liberal belief in rationality progress and the panaceas of economics and other social sciences and asserting in their stead the irreducible complexity of human motivation and the tragic inevitability of tragedy only the imagination trilling argues can give us access and insight into these realms and only the imagination can ground a reflective and considered rather than programmatic and dogmatic liberalism writing with acute intelligence about classics like huckleberry finn and the novels of henry james and f scott fitzgerald but also on such varied matters as the kinsey report and money in the american imagination trilling presents a model of the critic as both part of and apart from his society a defender of the reflective life that in our ever more rationalized world seems ever more necessary and ever more remote two desperately lonely disillusioned people meet at a new york bar spend the entire night together and take refuge in a garish hotel they fall in love but are afraid to believe a new life is possible translation of trois chambres a manhattan though one of the best known books in the world pinocchioat the same time remains unknown linked in many minds to the walt disney movie that bears little relation to carlo collodi s splendid original that story is of course about a puppet who after many trials succeeds in becoming a real boy yet it is hardly a sentimental or morally improving tale to the contrary pinocchio is one of the great subversives of the written page a

madcap genius hurtled along at the pleasure and mercy of his desires a renegade who in many ways resembles his near contemporary huck finn pinocchio the novel no less than pinocchio the character is one of the great inventions of modern literature a sublime anomaly the book merges the traditions of the picaresque of street theater and of folk and fairy tales into a work that is at once adventure satire and a powerful enchantment that anticipates surrealism and magical realism thronged with memorable characters and composed with the fluid but inevitable logic of a dream pinocchio is an endlessly fascinating work that is essential equipment for life soon to be a major motion picture from academy award winning director guillermo del toro and starring bradley cooper cate blanchett rooney mara and toni collette nightmare alley begins with an extraordinary description of a carnival show geek alcoholic and abject and the object of the voyeuristic crowd s gleeful disgust and derision going about his work at a county fair young stan carlisle is working as a carny and he wonders how a man could fall so low there s no way in hell he vows that anything like that will ever happen to him and since stan is clever and ambitious and not without a useful streak of ruthlessness soon enough he s going places onstage he plays the mentalist with a cute assistant before long his harried wife then he graduates to full blown spiritualist catering to the needs of the rich and gullible in their well upholstered homes it looks like the world is stan s for the taking at least for now an nyrb classics original shakespeare nietzsche wrote was montaigne s best reader a typically brilliant nietzschean insight capturing the intimate relationship between montaigne s ever changing record of the self and shakespeare s kaleidoscopic register of human character and there is no doubt that shakespeare read montaigne though how extensively remains a matter of debate and that the translation he read him in was that of john florio a fascinating polymath man about town and dazzlingly inventive writer himself florio s montaigne is in fact one of the masterpieces of english

parece brindarle en tres habitaciones en manhattan simenon se adentra en el corazón de la gran ciudad tras la pista de estos dos vagabundos que se aferran ajenos al espacio y al tiempo a un amour fou restored to print for the first time in more than forty years the president was hailed by the new york times as a tour de force at 82 the former premier lives in alert and suspicious retirement self exile on the normandy coast writing his anxiously anticipated memoirs and receiving visits from statesman and biographers in his library is the self condemning handwritten confession of the premier s former attaché chalamont hidden between the pages of a sumptuously produced work of privately printed pornography a confession that the premier himself had dictated and forced chalamont to sign now the long thwarted chalamont has been summoned to form a new coalition in the wake of the government s collapse the premier alone possesses the secret of chalamont s guilt of his true character and has publicly vowed he ll never be premier as long as i m alive nor when i m dead either inspired by french premier georges clemenceau the president is a masterpiece of psychological suspense and a probing account of the decline of power diva mawrdew czgowchwz pronounced mardu gorgeous bursts like the most brilliant of comets onto the international opera scene only to confront the deadly malice and black magic of her rivals outrageous and uproarious flamboyant and serious as only the most perfect frivolity can be james mccourt s entrancing send up of the world of opera has been a cult classic for more than a quarter century this comic tribute to the love of art is a triumph of art and love by a contemporary american master a new york review books original Élisabeth gille was only five when the gestapo arrested her mother and she grew up remembering next to nothing of her her mother was a figure a name irène némirovsky a once popular novelist a russian émigré from an immensely rich family a jew who didn t consider herself one and who even contributed to collaborationist periodicals and a woman

who died in auschwitz because she was a jew to her daughter she was a tragic enigma and a stranger it was to come to terms with that stranger that gille wrote in the mirador her mother s memoirs the first part of the book dated 1929 the year david goldner made némirovsky famous takes us back to her difficult childhood in kiev and st petersburg her father is doting her mother a beautiful monster while irene herself is bookish and self absorbed there are pogroms and riots parties and excursions then revolution from which the family flees to france a country of moderation freedom and generosity where at last she is happy some thirteen years later irène picks up her pen again everything has changed abandoned by friends and colleagues she lives in the countryside and waits for the knock on the door written a decade before the publication of suite française made irène némirovsky famous once more something gille did not live to see the mirador is a haunted and a haunting book an unflinching reckoning with the tragic past and a triumph not only of the imagination but of love not so long ago james mangan was a brilliant young poet these days however he toils as a journalist and shivers in the shadow of his glamorous movie star wife and now she has left him for her lover adrift and depressed jamie takes refuge with his father in whose house he turns up a 19th century daguerreotype bearing the initials j m and depicting a man who as it happens is jamie s spitting image could this be the only existing photograph of his purported ancestor the legendarily dissolute irish poet james clarence mangan obsessed by this strange resemblance and aided by an unexpected financial windfall jamie heads to ireland thinking at last to discover that elusive entity himself instead in the dreary coastal village of drishane he meets the mangans derelict eileen sullen dinny drunken and shrunken conor and the sexy and very available kathleen they know something for sure something to do with jamie and something they don t want him to find out the mangan inheritance is melodrama at its most inventive and suggestive an inquiry into the problem of identity

and the nature of ancestry that beguiles the reader with dark deeds wild humor and weird goings on on its way towards a shocking and terrifying and utterly satisfying conclusion
